DAN BACHMAN... HE BREEDS THEM FOR OUR GARDENS

On May 2nd we had the honor of having Dan Bachman as the guest speaker at our meeting. Dan is from Lebanon, Ohio, and is the owner of Valley of the Daylilies. Dan has 17 new offerings this year, including his long awaited H. 'Bo Diddley' and H. 'Relay For Life'. All 2009 proceeds from the sale of RFL will be donated to Breast Cancer Research through the Relay for Life Program.

Valley of the Daylilies has the most complete selection of spider and unusual daylilies found anywhere. They also have an expanded Historic Daylily listing of pre-1970 cultivars for the daylily collector. Dan grows over 3,000 registered daylilies and his website lists over 600 other cultivars. Valley of the Daylilies is an AHS Display Garden. This season, Dan expects to have several thousand Bachman seedlings blooming for their very first time. For anyone lucky enough to be in the area, Dan is part of the Southwest Ohio Hybridizer Group's 'Northern Mecca Tour' on July 3-4-5. This should be their peak bloom time! Dan's scheduled open house is July 5th. The tour will visit 7 hybridizers' gardens around the area, with a BBQ at the last garden.

Dan's current property is relatively flat. He learned with his previous lot to get something different because hauling supplies up and down hills was not fun! He wanted to be able to drive his cart everywhere, so he got a place in the valley.

Most days you will see Dan and his trusted dog, Nate, out amongst the daylilies with the golf cart. Nate is always at Dan's side. Nate will actually mope when he sees Dan get out his travel bags for a trip because he knows his best friend will be gone for a few days. And, if it's the bigger bags, he even mopes more, because Dan will be gone even longer!

Dan plants his seeds out in the fall around Thanksgiving time and lets them over-winter outdoors. This way, Mother Nature thins out the weak ones. He plants them like radish seeds, touching each other to aid in germination. They come up in the spring, about mid-March or so. Later in the summer he will transplant them, lining them out, where they will stay for up to 3 years. For weed prevention, he's just starting to use 6 ml black plastic, folded or cut to 4' wide and staked down over his beds. Using an auger, he cuts 3" holes evenly spaced down the length of the plastic (Dan calls it the Polston Method as he borrowed it from fellow hybridizer Tom Polston). The seedlings stay there until they are selected out. The plastic lasts for 3 yrs or one full rotation. It then gets thrown away after the last of the plants are culled out. The ground is reworked and manure added, new plastic is placed down, and he repeats the process. This is really cutting down on the time it takes to weed the seedlings. Dan has a source for alpaca manure just down the road on a nearby farm. It has very few weed seeds in it as it comes from the stable and has clean straw in it. It makes his daylilies grow and grow!

Dan believes in mixing new genetics with old and vice versa. The first spiders weren't favored by many people so they were left unused in hybridizing programs. He is now tapping into their potential with his own hybridizing program. To get the full spectrum of a crosses' potential, Dan will use the plant as a pod and pollen parent. He considers genetics much like a wedding, the joining of two lines. And he tries to add evergreens (EV) to the mix only as a garnish, using it very sparingly. In his philosophy, EV tends to be a dominate gene and remains ready to pop out at anytime. We need more dormant (DOR) genes in the North to survive our winters.

Dan says, "No daylily is more important than your own seedlings. They are the cornerstones of your foundation. Without them, your hybridizing program will collapse!" He also stresses "You need to go where your seedlings lead you! Work with what Mother Nature gives you." And, he says he will set one pod on a new seedling, but no more than one, to just get a peek at it's potential. That's like doing a test on a batch of cookies to see if you got the recipe right and didn't forget something.

The end of his presentation brought the auction. Dan had some lovely daylilies which we could bid on. He asked me to assist him as his 'Vanna'. I think I had them almost rolling in the aisles at times with my interpretation of Vanna! A good time was had by all!

STRUGGLING DAYLILIES FROM THE WINTER OF 2008 - 2009

After a record snowfall in December, little snow cover during the rest of the winter and frigid temperatures in February, WDS members were reporting cultivars that were either struggling or dead in far greater numbers than would otherwise be typical. Realizing this problem was not isolated to several gardens, it seemed useful to compile a list of those daylily cultivars and share that information with the membership. This extensive list can be found on the last two pages of this newsletter.

This list of dead and struggling daylilies represents the results from forty gardens. Semi evergreens comprised 45% and dormants only 13% of the cultivars on the list. Though usually only a small percentage of the daylilies in a member's individual garden, evergreens comprised 42% of the cultivars that were struggling or dead. This does not indicate that evergreens will not survive here in USDA Zones 4b and 5a. Of the 29 evergreens in my garden, only one evergreen cultivar is struggling.

This list is only a guide. Depending upon microclimates, and other factors, the experience of individual members with the same cultivar may vary. In my garden Gunda Abajian's 'Cajun Christmas' is struggling, while in John Sheehan's garden the same cultivar is doing fine. Some hybridizers also appear more frequently on the list. Cultivars from Stamile's appeared 35 times followed by the Salter's with 33. This does not necessarily mean to avoid cultivars from any particular hybridizer, but be aware that some of their cultivars many not be suited to this climate.

Though unfortunate, some adoption plants also were reported as struggling. One of the goals of the WDS Adoption Program is to procure newer cultivars to try in member gardens. There is some inherit risk in this endeavor, as some of the newer cultivars have not been tested under growing conditions in more northern gardens. Through the WDS Adoption Program the risk of trying newer cultivars is shared, as few individual members will risk the purchase of newer cultivars in the \$100+ range. Most often the adoption plants do well under our growing conditions and add greater diversity to the landscape of our gardens.

If a cultivar appears more than once on the list, as does 'Azure Wings', this indicates the cultivar was reported as struggling in more than one garden.

A big thank you to all who responded! This list of struggling daylilies would not have been possible without your support.

DIRECTIONS:

From the Beltline and take the Mineral Point Road exit

Turn left onto Mineral Point Roadv

Continue on Mineral Point Road until you reach a stop sign at the intersection with County Road S

Turn left onto County Road S

Follow County Road S until the junction with County J

Turn Right onto County J

Follow J to the first stop sign and turn left onto Hwy. 78

Almost immediately turn right to get back onto County J

Follow County J to next stop sign and turn left to remain on County J.

Note: This is the only place people occasionally get lost because if you turn right you go onto County JJ.

Follow County J to one last stop sign where it dead ends into County F.

Turn Right onto County F

Jeannette Golden's Garden is at the first barn on the right side of the road, which is exactly one quarter mile from the turn onto County F.

PARKING:

A few cars can park back to back in the driveway and one or two could park up next to the barn. Most will want to park on Blue Mounds Trail which is a right hand turn off of County F just before Jeannette Gordon's Garden. Blue Mounds Trail is a very quiet road and just a short walk to the garden. Some people may want to park right along County F by the farm. County F is a very traveled road and cars go pretty fast, which might make Blue Mounds Trail a better choice.
