

At first glance we are accustomed to seeing a daylily bloom with three petals and three sepals. Sometimes an anomaly will occur in which the bloom will defy that pattern. Fused flower and polymerous bloom are two of the striking daylily anomalies.

During their development two adjacent buds become conjoined forming a fused flower. The resulting flower will have more than usual three petals and three sepals. There will also be more than one pistol and more than the usual stamens. This fused flower trait is not genetic, and therefore would not be the focus of a successful hybridizing program.

In the author's experience the fused flower mutation is quite unusual. In all the gardens he has visited over the years, he has only witnessed this phenomenon twice. The first was in the garden of Ruth Horrall during one of her open gardens and the second was in his own garden on a flower of Pat Stamile's 'Ruby Spider'. You can image his surprise when he opened the email of entrants in the WDS Photo Contest and saw Rhonda Veroeven's submission of a fused flower on Wyatt LeFever's 'Forsyth Paleface', as pictured. This is the first time this has occurred in the 12 years of the WDS Photo Contest. After fused flower was mentioned at the WDS meeting Cynthia Wadsworth, sent me a photo of fused flower on Mead's 'Hyperion' she had taken. Both 'Forsyth Paleface' and 'Hyperion' illustrate the characteristic of a fused flower.

The second anomaly is a polymerous bloom. Previously a polymerous bloom was often call a polytepal flower. The American Hemerocallis Society has adopted the term polymerous to align with botanic terminology.

Polymerous describes a daylily bloom from a single flower bud with more than the normal number of three sepals and three petals. Polymerous daylilies will usually have the same number of extra sepals and petals. The bloom will also have extra stamens, but only one pistil. These characteristics are illustrated in the image from our garden of Pat Stamile's 'Dancing on Air', which has four sepals and four petals, but only one pistil. Another example are two flowers on Larry Graces' 'Destined to See'. On rare occasions a polymerous daylily can exhibit as many six sepals and six petals.

It is not uncommon for some daylilies to have a flower that is polymerous, but the polymerous blooms are not consistent. 'Destined to See' has not exhibited another polymerous flower since the picture of the two blooms was taken.

Since the trait is genetic, a few hybridizers have focused on making the polymerous blooms more consistent. Notable among them is Don Herr, who spoke to the club in 2011. Example of his polymerous daylilies, some of which he indicates are as high as 95% polymerous, can be seen on his web site (<a href="http://donherrdaylilies.com">http://donherrdaylilies.com</a>).

Both fused flower and polymerous blooms provide something intriguing to look for during the upcoming daylily season.

#### Winners of the Thirteen Annual WDS Photo Contest

Category 3 – A daylily with companion plants or a garden critter landing on or nestled in a daylily flower or daylilies featured in garden or landscape setting. This category had 27 entries compared with 20 last year.

Though the contest is designed to select the top two vote getters in each category, the quality and creativity of the entries made this year made this impossible in the Category I and Category 3. There was a five-way tie in Category 3. Only the vote count in Category 2 produced two top vote getters. With advances in technology and an eye for a good picture, entries have become more varied and creative since the inception of the first WDS and creative since the inception of the first WDS photo Contest in 2006.

The votes are counted and winners have been announced in the Thirteen Annual WDS Photo Contest. In all 56 members voted for their contest favorites at the WDS February meeting.

The contest format featured three categories.

Each WDS Member could submit a maximum of three photos. The three photos could all be assigned to one category or distributed among the three contest categories, which are briefly described below.

Category 1 – Close up of a single. This category proved the most popular with 35 entries compared to 28 last year.

Category 2 – Group of two more daylily flowers without companion plants. This category had 29 entries compared 21 to last year.

A photo of a bright yellow daylily clump accented by colorful perennials was Joanne Rowe's winning entry.

Each Contest winner will receive a certificate for a free plant of their choice at the WDS Daylily Sale in August at Olbrich Botanical Gardens and their choice of a mug or tile artistically imprinted with their winning photo by WDS Member, R. On July 14 and 15, 2018, we have the opportunity to see six of the seven gardens that will be on display during the AHS National Daylily Convention, which we are hosting in 2019.

Our club is willing to subsidize the Saturday, July 14, 2018 cost for a bus to see the three gardens that are the farthest away from Madison. We need a minimum of 40 people to do the bus trip.

The bus tour will include Francis and Genni Kleckner's Work-In-Progress daylily garden near Muscoda; Diane and John Goodman's garden near Prairie du Sac; and Rick and Barb Kaja's Lilies of Lodi daylily garden near Lodi.

After visiting Kleckner's garden, we will have lunch in Prairie du Sac.

After lunch, we will visit Diane and John Goodman's daylily garden and will be able to see the Englerth seedlings bed on their property in rural Prairie du Sac, on Lake Wisconsin. The last garden we will visit is Kaja's Lilies of Lodi.

WDS budgeted a substantial dollar amount for this trip, so the cost per person will be reasonable. The budgeted amount will pay toward the bus ride, lunch, bottled water, and tips. WDS\$ dollars will not be accepted in your payment per person.

Badger Bus requests a commitment from our group no more than thirty days from now. The deadline for signing up for the trip will be April 28, 2018, which is the date of our next WDS meeting at Savannah Oaks School. Again, we need 40 people minimum, to make the trip happen.

Remember, our garden hosts will have a full year after our visit, to work on and improve their gardens before the AHS National Convention next year; so do not expect the gardens to be in 'perfect' shape, but they will be a work-in-progress.

On Sunday, July 15, 2018, we can tour the remaining three gardens on our own. The three are the Jim Herwig and Wilma Brower-Herwig garden in Deerfield, the Conrad and Mary Wrzesinski garden in Middleton, and the Tom and Rosemary Kleinheintz garden in Madison.

Since we are hosting the AHS National Convention, we won't have the chance to tour the daylily display gardens in 2019, because we will be busy working at the Marriott Hotel, and there won't be room on the buses. This is our chance to see the gardens exactly one year before the big event!


