Darrel Apps Speaking

Our April speaker was another Wisconsin treat! Francis outdid himself by getting Darrel Apps. Darrel Apps began breeding daylilies during his time at University of Kentucky. He made his first cross in 1969, which is over fifty years of hybridizing! He discussed the challenges of making a living with daylilies and that things are different today than they were when he started. He had several trademarks on a few of his plants so royalties from sales were made possible. He also shared that the database makes hybridizing easier for hybridizers today.

He still makes many seedlings a year which he said is scaling it back. His focus on tet rebloomers and northern hardy varieties made it hard not to have a large wishlist from his introductions.

His focus continues to be on northern hardy plants and he prefers dormant plants.

He likes dormants because he feels they are easier to clean and better for rust resistance.

He liked to incorporate genetics from southern tender plants because of their beauty.

He worked hard to make pretty dormant northern hardy flowers.

He ran his nursery, Woodside Gardens, in Bridgeton, New Jersey and then he returned to Wild Rose, WI. He has introduced over 450 daylilies and earned the Betrand Farr hybridizing award from the ADS. He now sells his daylilies through Graziano Gardens.

greenhouse to take southern genetics and infuse them into his program to make the genetics northern hardy. The last presenter for the day was Jamie Gossard, also a Stout winning hybridizer. He shared his program and that he grows about 30,000 seedlings in his basement. He shared his new intros and his spacecoast daylilies (his Florida program)

Culver Daylily Farm Brightened Up Our May



On a cool, rainyish Saturday (what else is new), the Wisconsin Daylily Society was treated to an almost 60 minute presentation by Bryan Culver of Culver Farms Daylilies. Bryan was originally scheduled for last year in May, but had to cancel for health reasons, but boy did he ever make up for it. Comfortably ensconced on his 7th generation family former dairy farm (with great soil to boot), Bryan has used his background interest in genetics (he was a registered Holstein breeder), to craft a program for those of us living in the north. His motto, "To get ahead, you have to see what's behind," drives a goal to have great plant habit, along with bold colors and striking eyes. What good is a beautiful flower if the plant is "crap?"

With his location in southern Ontario, Canada, just north of Lake Erie, his seedlings/plants are grown in field conditions, sometimes without snow cover, so the freeze/thaw cycle will weed out the weak and unsuitable plants for our northern growing area. Bryan says that his plants that

survive his southern Ontario winter, still need to have good plant habit. He prefers his plants to be at least 32 inches high, have a reasonable bud count, and good branching. As much as the beautiful faces, Bryan also emphasized his branching in his slides. Also in his slides there was a notable bias to round form and ruffles---lots of Stamile and Salter genetics at play, he noted. This was confirmed by checking out previous introductions on his website and by the cultivars provided for the auction. Going forward, Bryan is also working with orange crosses, one of which, the exquisite "Mr. Carrots," caused an audible reaction from the very appreciative crowd. I think speaking for the group, we were all very impressed with what product is currently coming out of Waterford, Ontario and we look forward to what may be coming out in the future.

I chose distinction


Hybridization
