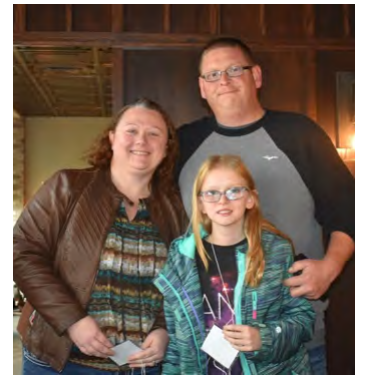

The board took a risk with choosing this location (The team was headed by Pat Sturdevant and Mike Stafford), as it was still under construction when the contract was signed. While the arrangement of the space was not optimal for our meeting needs, the seating was lovely for having great conversations with other members!

Upon arrival, we were wowed with the vast number of excellent door prizes from which we could choose at the end of the meeting. The delicious appetizers were brought out as a special treat from the board for a job well done by our club's hosting of the 2019 ADS National Daylily Convention. The promise that the majority of the proceeds would go to the benefit of the membership was appreciated and so was having extra fancy treats prior to the actual meal. They were all eaten in short order, proof of how delicious they were!

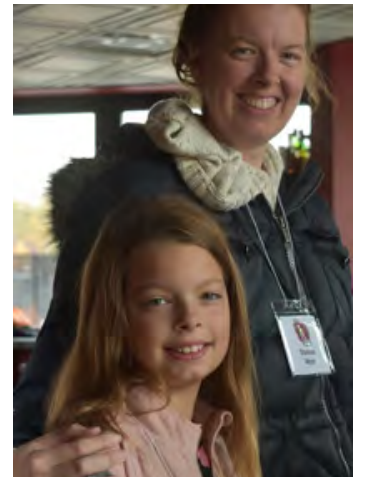
After a quick welcome, it was time for an all-you-care-to-eat buffet. The selections the board made were simply delicious. Pork, chicken, beef, potatoes, veggies...the list could go on and on. A huge shout out to the WDS Board for putting together such a fabulous feast!

Once the meal was completed, we brought the annual meeting to order and held the Annual Business Meeting. The required meeting items such as accepting the Treasurer's and Secretary's reports went without issue. A very impressive national financial report was shared. The Board shared that sizable donations would be made to Region 2 earmarked to support the newsletter and to ADS earmarked for the youth program since we did so well financially. In the end, we donated \$5,000 to region 2 and \$10,000 to the ADS youth fund. That is pretty impressive, considering we will continue to make donations to West Madison Agricultural Station, Allen Centennial Gardens, and at the most recent board meeting, it was determined that since we have such an amazing relationship with Rotary Botanical Gardens, that they will also be recipients of an annual donation.

We then voted for the new board members. Genni Kleckner, Bobbi Johnson, Steven King, and Wilma Brouwer-Herwig were unanimously voted in for a two-year term. Thank you to the four new members for their willingness to be in leadership positions and help the society function. A continued thank you to the four members which have terms ending next year- Monique Warnke, Pat Sturdevant, Mike Stafford, and Sue Hill.

WDS Annual Meeting Was a Jumping Good Time

The club went on to vote unanimously for 5% of our plant sale to be donated to Rotary Botanical Gardens in Janesville. Now that they are on the list of those that the society will regularly donate to, they will no longer be eligible for future 5% donations. Since the choice of them to receive the donation happened prior to the board's decision, they will still receive the 5% donation.

Some new business items were also discussed and determined. The wording was changed to the membership renewal process which makes those that join WDS during/after the WDS Annual Plant Sale will have the remainder of the year and the following year as members. There was a great discussion on the actual wording of the proposal, and after the discussion, it passed. The second new business item was to offer a Wisconsin Daylily Society Lifetime Membership. There was much less discussion regarding this proposal, and it is now an option to purchase a lifetime membership! The third new business item was a change to the WDS Annual Photo Contest categories. After receiving multiple requests, the board wanted to bring it to a vote of the membership to change Category 3 - "A daylily with companion plants or a garden critter landing on or nestled in a daylily flower or daylilies featured in garden or landscape setting." After a short discussion, it was agreed that Category 3 be split into two separate categories. The membership agreed to the following split: Category 3 - A daylily with a garden critter landing on or nestled in a daylily flower Category 4- Daylilies featured in garden or landscape setting. The fourth and final new business item was the approval of a legacy award. The membership unanimously approved without the need of much discussion for WDS to sponsor an Individual Cultivar Award to be voted on annually by the Garden Judges through ADS called the "Wisconsin Multiform Award" in which garden judges will vote. To be considered for this award, a cultivar would need to possess all of the qualities and characteristics as determined by ADS as multiform. Now that WDS has approved it, the next step is to work through the Awards and Honors Committee to accept or deny the proposal (since I am the new Awards and Honors Chair, I do not think passing it through committee should be a problem). If approved by the committee, it would be an action item presented to the ADS Board for them to vote on it. We will know more in the near future, and I will be sure to keep everyone apprised of the situation!



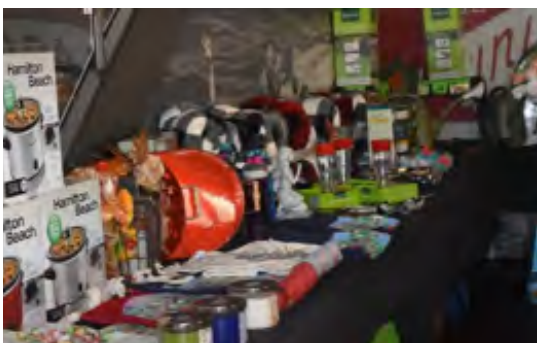

WDS Annual Meeting Was a Jumping Good Time

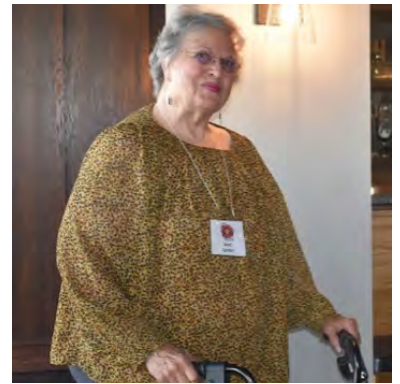

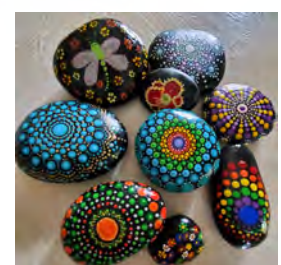
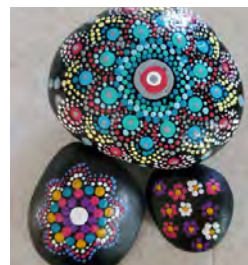

WDS Popularity Poll

The WDS Daylily poll this year reminds me of the proverb, ‘Necessity is the mother of invention.’ Perhaps a better rendition of the proverb for our poll situation this year might be ‘Necessity is the mother of doing something different’. After an unforeseen development, the WDS poll was not taken at the Annual Meeting, as in the past.

The poll each year has become a tradition each for the Wisconsin Daylily Society. Out of necessity to continue the tradition a different approach had to be tried for the poll this year. Two venues were selected. Part of the daylily society members were directed to a web site to vote on line. Unfortunately, the web version did not provide a space for write-in votes, was a definite limitation. If a web version is ever in the future, the application must include the ability for write-in votes. Since the web version had a limit of 100 participants, another venue was needed to meet the entire membership. The other daylily society members received an email with the same list of cultivars as the web version and were asked to reply with their selection. Since this was an email, it was easy to include a write-in selection. This also provided the opportunity to compare the two approaches. In the end, I was surprised that the email version had just slightly more respondents than the web version.

After combining the votes from the web and email venues, the first-place winner this year was George Doorakian’s ‘*Rose F. Kennedy*’. Last year George’s cultivar placed 4th in the poll. ‘*Rose F. On a personal note, ‘*Rose F. Kennedy*’ has graced our garden since the fall of 2014 and does not disappoint. This summer the first flower appeared on July 11th, which is a week later than usual.

Though the American Daylily Society now only lists the top five cultivars for each regional poll, the WDS list has 8 cultivars, since there was an uncanny 5-way tie for 4th place. Nan Ripley’s ‘*Scarlet Pimpernel*’, which was awarded the Stout Medal this year, was among the cultivars tied for 4th place. This was the first year ‘*Scarlet Pimpernel*’ placed in the WDS poll. To usher in the 14th annual WDS Photo Contest an exciting change is taking place for 2020. Previously Category Three featured a daylily clump with companion plants or multiple daylilies in a garden or landscape setting or a garden critter landing on or nestled in a daylily flower. From the variety of photos that have been submitted in more recent photo contests, it became obvious that focus of Category Three was too broad and needed to be changed. The focus of Category Three has been narrowed to feature a daylily clump with companion plants or multiple daylilies in a garden or landscape setting. A Category Four entitled, Creative Artistry, has been added featuring a daylily pictured from a different perspective or a garden critter landing on or nestled in a daylily flower. Examples of this new Category Four can be readily seen in Barry Rowe's *Through the Looking Glass* photo and Rhonda Veroeven's closeup photo of a little frog peering out from the center of a daylily flower.

With four categories there are now even more chances win. Be one of those winners! Revisit your daylily photo collection to select your photos to enter in the WDS 2020 Photo Contest! 2020 Photo Contest Rules

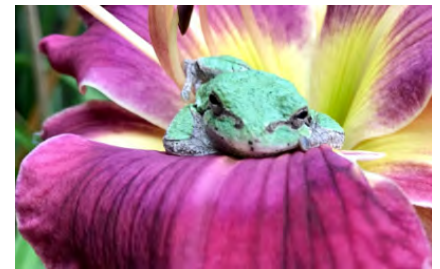
- All entrants must be members of the Wisconsin Daylily Society.
- Photos may be of a named cultivar or a seedling. If you submit a photo of a named cultivar, please include the name of the cultivar.
- Photos may be submitted in the following four categories:

Category 1: Single Flower – Close-up of a single bloom without companion plants or other daylilies prominent in the background.

Category 2: Clump – Group of two more daylily flowers without companion plants, or other daylilies prominent in the background.

Category 3: Daylilies in the Landscape – A daylily clump with companion plants or multiple daylilies in a garden or landscape setting.

Category 4: Creative Artistry – A daylily viewed from a different perspective or a garden critter landing on or nestled in a daylily flower.

- Each entrant may submit a maximum of four photos distributed in any fashion among the categories of their choice. With a family membership, each family member may submit four photos for the contest.
- Photos must be submitted in digital form in high resolution.
- If an entrant submits multiple photos, only one photo may win regardless of the total number of votes each photo receives.
- The person submitting the photo must have taken the picture.
- Photos need not be taken in the member's garden.
- Winning photos will be selected by vote of the WDS membership. Each WDS member may vote for only one photo in each category.
- The Wisconsin Daylily Society reserves the right to display winning photos at WDS functions, including but not limited to the WDS web site, WDS Garden Expo booth, WDS scrap book, WDS Facebook or use in WDS presentations.
- Contest winners will receive a certificate for free plant of their choice at the WDS Daylily Sale in August and their choice of a mug or tile imprinted with their winning photo.
