Why Vote in the Region 2 Popularity Poll

Many of us are overwhelmed, indeed confused, when confronting the most up-to-date price lists from hybridizers. In late winter and early spring the lists appear on a daily basis in our mailboxes. Descriptions of new introductions that defy our wildest imaginations, complete with beautiful photos that tempt our bank accounts. If the novice daylily grower faces these lists, he may well despair of ever being able to make anything like sensible choices among all these cultivars for his taste, bank account, and ultimately his region. One should certainly study these descriptions of the newest introductions, but remember: along with the latest, and highly touted cultivars, nearly all commercial growers offer the older, classic varieties as well. These are tucked into the list and are usually offered for \$5.00 to \$10.00, often a little higher for the truly classic varieties because they are so popular.

All daylily enthusiasts, both novice and seasoned alike, need a basic guideline to help choose cultivars that perform well in his own locality. The Popularity Poll serves well as this guideline. This is why it is important for AHS members to vote in the Popularity Poll near the end of the bloom season each year. The Poll can be an accurate guide to those outstanding cultivars of our Region only if a large

number of our AHS members participate by voting.

This is a call to think about the Popularity Poll before our summer bloom season for 1993 begins. Perhaps keeping a little notebook near the garden would be in order. Here one could make notes on what one discovers on a daily basis in his own yard. Making notes trains one's eyes to see a daylily. What qualities should the grower note? One could start with color, form, texture, growth habits, first bloom; as well, notes on weather conditions and other factors as one sees them. What hybridizers are represented well in

qualities in other gardens in your local area, as well as farther afield. The AHS's The Daylily

Journal prints the guidelines for the number of cultivars one should put on the list. I suggest voting for those cultivars that performed CONSISTENTLY well in your own yard and others. If a particular daylily caught your eye in a half dozen gardens in your area, chances are it should be on your Poll! Let's have a high percentage of AHS mem-

that article to find out all that was covered. I want to give a general impression and feeling of the symposium.

Gene Sawyer and I drove down early Saturday morning, arriving at Michigan City about 11:00 AM. After checking into the motel we ran into Bill and Mary Powell (Bill is WDS President), and Lynda Hilton, a friend I met several years ago at a regional meeting. During our lunch at Pizza Hut we talked about, what else?...daylilies! Lynda grows almost 2,000 named cultivars and we learned of the problems she encountered when she started selling them to the public last summer.

The meeting room for the Symposium was comfortable but not real large. This meant that you may end up sitting next to someone like Stewart Oaks (Oaks Daylilies, Corryton, TN), Leo Sharpe (Hybridizer, Brookwood Gar-

dens), John Benz (Hybridizer, Ohio), or John Schabel (Hybridizer and species expert). To be able to rub elbows both figuratively and literally with these nationally known folks was exciting.

After our evening banquet we watched a slide program of unnamed seedlings from Region 2

This will be the second year that Catherine Wilson's garden is on the tour. Located just outside the south-east corner of Madison, Catherine has been growing daylilies "since I was a blushing bride", as she puts it. Her garden features over 200 daylilies in an imaginative terraced garden setting. The garden is located at 3812 County Trunk AB, Cottage Grove. Take highway 12 & 18 East out of Madison and turn North onto county trunk AB The garden is located about two miles North, on the East side of Co. AB, next door to the Farwell Pool Company. There is space for parking in the driveway area.

Wally Porterfield now has 200 daylilies growing in his yard and has the complete collection of "Altissima" daylilies which send scapes up to a spectacular height of five feet and higher. Take highway 151 to Sun Prairie and turn off at the highway 19 (third) exit. Go three blocks south on Hywy 19 (Bristol Street) and turn left onto East MacArthur Street. Wally's place is about three more blocks down and on the left. Park on the Street.

Located just six blocks away, Paul Meske's garden features over 200 established daylilies in informal beds laid out in his back yard. Paul has been trying to get a representative sample of major hybridizers and especially hybridizers in AHS Region 2. Take the same Hywy 19 exit as for Wally's except you go one more block south on Bristol Street and turn to the right onto West Goodland Street. Paul's house is located toward the end of the block on the South side of the street, a blue house. His address is 151 W. Goodland St, Sun Prairie, WI. Park in the street.

Betty Giacomino takes care of two acres of yard and been collecting daylilies for the last three years. Her garden has many different perennials but features daylilies. Take highway I-43 to exit 89 and turn to the east onto hywy C (Pioneer) for two blocks and turn right (south) onto Lakeshore. Proceed to Hemlock Street and turn left (east). Proceed to Birchwood Lane and turn right (south). Betty's address is 13743 Birchwood Lane, Mequon, WI

Karen Hart has a small city lot and has had to contend with too many flowers in too little space. The grand-daughter of the late Olive Pauly, Karen is carrying on the family tradition of growing award winning daylilies. Take I-94 East, and near the County Stadium get in the left hand lane and turn onto North Hywy 41. At the third exit down, turn to the left onto Washington Blvd. Five block down is N 52nd Street, turn right. Karen's address is 1922 N. 52nd St., Milwaukee WI. Most of her daylilies are in the front yard. She says "You can't miss it".

Arthur Blodgett boasts an official American Hemero-callis Society Daylily Display Garden. Art does some hybridizing and has registered APOLLO'S MELODY in 1991, a 5.5 inch dormant yellow tetraploid flower on a 28 inch scape. He will have more seedlings to see in addition to numerous other named cultivars. Take I-94 to Hywy 18 West. Turn to the left on Hywy 164 south. Proceed to the 4th stoplight to Co. Trunk C (East Broadway) and turn to the right. Art is located at the corner of Broadway and Fisk. His address is 1008 E. Broadway, Waukesha WI. If you see the park, you've gone too far, turn around.
