GUIDELINES FOR WISCONSIN DAYLILY SOCIETY CHARITABLE CONTRIBUTIONS

Up to this point WDS has given a percentage of its annual daylily sale proceeds to a charitable organization. Members have been encouraged to nominate deserving organizations of any kind. At the annual fall meeting WDS members have voted on the nominations. The organization with the highest number of votes has then been the charitable recipient for the following year's sale.

After much discussion and suggestions from membership, the board has adopted the following guidelines to ensure the donation is distributed fairly and in a way that is consistent with our horticultural mission.

1. The organization receiving the funds must be a Wisconsin-based non-profit and must either have a horticultural mission or use the funds for a garden or plant-related project.
2. Once a non-profit organization has received a charitable contribution from the WDS sale, it is ineligible for nomination the following year.
3. Nominations must be submitted to the WDS president by {date to be determined by the board each year}. A brief one paragraph write-up about the organization must accompany the nomination, describing how the organization meets criterion #1.

At last year's annual meeting you voted to send our 5% to HospiceCare this year. They will be receiving a check for \$1,280 which we hope they will use it for landscaping, perhaps with daylilies.

Which organization would you like to have receive next year's 5% of sales proceeds? It's up to you let let us know.

Please submit your nomination to Conrad Wrzesinski by October 15th. Be sure to include a brief description of why you think they are deserving, following the above criteria.

RAIN, RAIN GO AWAY.....AND COME BACK AFTER THE SALE

Never has our sale week been as wet and muddy as 2007! Despite 4 inches of rain the night before, a troupe of 11 traveled out to Kleckners' in Muscoda to help dig, divide and label over 100 different clumps from their garden. (Those clumps provided almost 1300 plants for sale - a wonderful gift from Francis, Genni and Jake.)

We weren't through with rain. The next morning 8 hardy souls showed up at the West Madison Ag Station to dig. The rain began as we began and let up just as we dug the last plant. Naturally! What a muddy bunch we were. That same evening we went out to dig in Waterloo at John & Marian Barth's home. Yes, we brought lots of their clay back to Olbrich - along with 400 plants for sale. Another generous gift.

Dividing muddy clumps on Thursday and Friday brought new challenges - how and where to wash the mud off; how to create a clean, attractive product for sale; and how to keep bags dry so labels would stick. The larger prep tent was a perfect place to work and all the mud stayed outside. Thanks to Olbrich for the use of their water and a place to leave the debris. By 7:00 pm the job was done - 698 different cultivars and over 5,000 plants were ready for our customers on Saturday morning.

Of course, as you might guess, the rain began on Saturday as our early birds waited in line for the starting bell. Nice folks that we are, we let them start shopping early - and shop they did!! During the course of the weekend we eventually accumulated 4 1/2 inches of rain and over \$25,500 in sales - only \$1,000 less than last year! It's interesting to note that we accomplished this amid rain, without Olbrich Gardens foot traffic (who wants to walk the gardens in the rain??), and without the Butterfly Exhibit visitors. Congratulations to all of you.

Nothing as successful as this can be accomplished without the efforts of many, many people. Special thanks to Gene Dewey for continuing to maintain our plant and buyers databases; to Terri Maliszewski-Kane and Pat Sturdevant for keeping us well fed and watered; to Chris Zeltner for recruiting and organizing our enthusiastic volunteers; to Terry Conklin for his willingness to take home and plant some of the choice leftovers to grow for sale next year. Last, but not least, a big THANKS to the 30 members who donated 3,406 plants (out of a total 5,251) from their own gardens, and to the 88 volunteers who never quit until the job was done. That's how we are able to achieve such success. Our thanks to everyone for pitching in.

Everyone who worked at the sale has again received a certificate granting them free admission to the Annual Meeting. We can't think of a better way to say "Thank You." If you worked and haven't received a certificate, please let me know.

A GOOD TIME WITH FRIENDS, FOOD AND DAYLILIES

In the company of friends, with good food, a chance to adopt a special daylily and the opportunity to bid on former adoption daylilies was the setting for the annual Wisconsin Daylily Society Potluck, Adoption and Auction held at the Fitchburg Community Center. The festivities began with the taping of a music video invitation to the 2008 Summer Meeting performed by the Wisconsin Daylily Society Choir directed by Ruth Horall and accompanied on the kazoo by Mary Wrzesinski. While enjoying the good food brought by WDS Members, a power point presentation featuring images of the adoption plants was shown to help members select their favorite daylilies and hope their number would be drawn before someone else selected the plant. To be eligible for the drawing for an adoption plant, a person must be a member of both the Wisconsin Daily Society and the American Hemerocallis Society. The adoption plants are all newer introductions, which were either purchased or donated by different hybridizers. The adoption program, which is chaired by John Sheehan, provides members with the opportunity to add an interesting and usually a rather expensive daylily to their gardens. After three years the increase from the adoption plant is returned to the club for the annual auction.

The tag team of Bill Powell and Conrad Wrzesinski conducted a spirited auction with assistance from Jake Kleckner. During the bidding for each daylily, an image of the daylily was projected to assist members on deciding whether to bid. Each bidder received a tally card to record their winning bids. This process helped facilitate the payment process at the conclusion of the auction. A total of 78 plants were auctioned. The total proceeds from the auction, including WDS dollars, was \$2,075. The highest winning bids were \$65 for 'Passions Promise' (Pat Sayers – 1999) and 'Victorian Lace' (Pat Stamile – 1999). By the conclusion of the auction 39 people had won at least one bid and the opportunity to add a new daylily to their gardens.

EIGHT NEW GARDEN JUDGES JOIN IN PICKING THE WINNERS

Picking the daylilies that deserve special recognition by the American Hemerocallis Society is determined by the vote of the Garden Judges. Each year the American Hemerocallis Society sends an Award and Honors ballot to each Garden Judge. The ballot includes candidates for the coveted Stout Silver Metal. Given in memory of Dr. Arlow Burdette Stout, who is considered to be the father of modern daylily breeding in North America, the Stout Silver Medal is highest award a cultivar can receive. The ballot also includes candidates for the Award of Merit, Honorable Mention and a series of specialty awards.

Becoming a Garden Judge involves meeting membership requirements and the completion of two garden Workshops. The focus of the first garden workshop includes the history and criteria of each daylily award. Recognizing distinction, which is a characteristic, feature or quality that make a daylily appealing is the focus of the second garden workshop. The second garden workshop usually takes place at one of the four gardens during a regional meeting or the AHS Convention.

This year eight members of the Wisconsin Daylily Society became Garden Judges and were eligible to take part in voting for daylilies that deserve special recognition by the American Hemerocallis Society. These new Garden Judges include Sue Christofferson, Ed Kraus, Jim Fitzpatrick, Ruth Horall, June Johnson, Rosemary Kleinheinz, Tom Kleinheinz, and Conrad Wrzesinski.

Becoming a Garden Judge for these eight new members began with the first garden workshop conducted by Bob Schwarz during his visit in April. Gus Guzinski, Region 2 Scientific Studies Liaison, conducted the second garden workshop at the Region Two Summer meeting in Evansville, Indiana.

The eight new Garden Judges join five other Garden Judges from the Wisconsin Daylily Society, which include: Paul Meske, Hiram Percy, Roger Popelka, William E. Powell, and John E. Sheehan. In addition several other WDS members are in the process of becoming Garden Judges. This is quite an achievement for members of the Wisconsin Daylily Society. Of the 17 Garden Judges from the state of Wisconsin, 13 are members of the Wisconsin Daylily Society.

Kathi Dwelle told us that on August 3rd she had 17 cultivars in bud in her shady garden. They included H. 'Autumn Prince', 'Bittersweet Honey', 'Broadway Flash', 'Cherry Cheeks', 'Chicago Apache', 'Exit Light', 'Evergold', 'Flameburst', 'Green Flutter', 'Indian Paintbrush', 'Olin Criswell', 'Prairie Moonlight', 'Real Wind', 'Singing Sixteen', 'So Lovely', and 'Tender Love'.

On August 16th Tom & Rosemary K. had the following in bloom. H. 'White Dish', 'Frilly Jammies' (a Bill Powell intro), 'Johanna Lee Ahrens', 'Going Places', 'Chantelle', 'Brookwood Rosato', 'Sears Tower', 'Autumn Minaret', and 'Siloam Paul Watts'. 'Chantelle', 'Autumn Minaret', and 'Johanna Lee Ahrens' were still blooming the 1st of September. This fall we added 'Sweet Butter Cream', 'Suzy Cream Cheese', and 'Sandra Elizabeth' which we hope will all be blooming in September next year. Will let you know.

Lane Revenal found the following blooming on August 16th: H. 'Olin Criswell', 'Autumn Minaret', and reblooms on 'Strawberry Candy' and 'Infinity'.

On September 11th Conrad Wrzesinski mentioned that 'Autumn Minaret' and 'The Last Melon' were still in flower. 'Penny's Worth' continued to rebloom.

Thanks to all who responded to my plea. There's lots to put on your "Want List" as you pour over catalogues this winter.
