Photo Contest Rules:

- All entrants must be members of the Wisconsin Daylily Society.
- Each entrant may submit a maximum of two photos. With a family membership, each family member may submit two photos for the contest.
- If an entrant submits two photos, only one photo may win regardless of the total number of votes each photo receives.
- The entrant submitting the photo must have taken the picture.
  - Photos need not be taken in the member's garden.
- Photos may be an individual bloom, cultivar clump, daylilies with companion plants, or daylilies in a landscape (garden) setting.
- Photos must be submitted in digital form. (Higher resolution preferred.)
- Winning photos will be selected by vote of the WDS membership. Each member may vote for a maximum of three photos.

#### WDS BY-LAWS AMENDED

At the 2007 Annual Meeting the WDS Membership voted over whelmingly to amend the Society By-Laws. The amendments addressed the needs and practices of the Wisconsin Daylily Society that have changed since the By-Laws were last amended during the Annual Meeting in 2001. The amended By-Laws addressed five areas of concern: 1) length of terms Board officers may serve, 2) responsibility for publicity, 3) financial audits, 4) Board member nominations, and 5) WDS committees.

- 1) Board officers may now serve more than two years in the same position, but not more than two consecutive two-year terms on the Board.
- 2) Publicity for society events has become shared responsibility, usually among the committee chairs, which is now reflected in the WDS By-Laws.
- 3) The current practice of an annual audit of the financial records of the Society is now part of the By-Laws. This prudent fiscal policy was not a provision of the WDS By-Laws adopted in 2001.
- 4) Facilitating the recruitment of Board members was addressed in the changes to the Nominating Committee structure and receiving nominations from the floor at the Annual Meeting.
- 5) Only one committee (display gardens) was enumerated in the WDS By-Laws adopted in 2001. For 2008 the Wisconsin Daylily Society has thirteen committees. The amended By-Laws do not mention specific committees, but authorizes the creation of committees as the need arises.

#### WDS TOP TEN POLL RESULTS

In the latest Wisconsin Daylily Society Top Ten Favorites Poll conducted at the fall 2007 Annual Meeting, H. 'Primal Scream' was a clear winner with 43 votes. Second place was another one of Curt Hanson's introductions, 'Bella Lugosi', which received 39 votes. 'Primal Scream' and 'Bella Lugosi' came in 2nd and 3rd in the in the 2007 Region 2 Popularity Poll. 'Ruby Spider', which came in 3rd in the WDS Poll, was the top pick in the Region 2 Poll. 'Space-coast Starburst' made its first appearance among the WDS Top Ten Favorites. Karol Emmerich's introductions are beginning to make an appearance on the WDS Poll. Her 'Woman at the Well' (2005) received 7 votes. The Stout Silver Medal winner, 'Lavender Blue Baby' tied for 12th place in the Region 2 Poll, but received only one vote in the WDS Poll. Then it was time for the featured guest, hybridizer Karol Emmerich, who was greeted with a burst of loud applause. Karol was a lively, enthusiastic and entertaining speaker who came to her love for the lovely hemerocallis a mere blip-in-time ago (circa 1992). She fell so hard, though, that she left a very successful 21year business career she loved to chase her new paramour with all that her slight build could muster. In the beginning, all she wanted to accomplish was "plant a garden around the pergola at the front of the house". The following year all she wanted to accomplish was "paint the end of her cul-de-sac with flowers". When the hem bug bit her in earnest, her horizons exponentially expanded and all she wanted to accomplish was "paint the world with daylilies". And she is making vast strides in reaching that goal by painstakingly cultivating acres of seeds which she evaluates exactingly in her efforts to produce northern hardy, specially named daylilies (none

of those slightly off-color or suggestive monikers for her beauties). She started buying better quality parents who injected better genetic material into her lines. When

she wanted to learn more, she apprenticed with Larry Grace and actually lived near him in the south for months at a time. When she needed more room for her babies, she bought a 110 acre tract of land that included a defunct quarry. When she wanted to speed up her program, she built a humongous greenhouse. When land needed to be reclaimed from the dead quarry, a highway crew was hired to get the job done fast!

All of these dedicated efforts have resulted in some truly excellent cultivars springing up from her lines. Who isn't familiar with her rose-purple, dark eyed and edged creation H. 'Enduring Freedom'? Want bold eyes? Try her H. 'Moses In The Bullrushes' or H. 'Storm Shelter'. Edges? Try her H. 'Heartbeat Of Heaven'. How about ruffles? Try her H. 'Secret Of Contentment'. She has based her program on good genetics and not focused on simply creating a pretty face. That has lead to strong AND beautiful plants that work in the harsh climate of Zone 5. Karol tests her plants outdoors at her Minnesota gardens and surviving a mild winter does not count. She will be the first to tell you not to buy a specific cultivar of hers if she thinks its survival in your area is iffy. She summed up her presentation with a peak at what she is currently developing. As she said, and her pictures showed, "The future is bright!" And it's VERY bright for 12 of our lucky members who won gift certificates from her Springwood Gardens. The rest of us just basked in the glow of her upbeat manner and slides of her wonderful creations while discretely wiping the drool from our chins.
