Plan to be at the **West Ag Research Station on Mineral Point Rd. on January 11th from 1-4 pm** to meet Sherry Combs, director of the UW-Madison Soil & Plant Analysis Lab within the Department of Soil Science. Photo Contest Rules

- All entrants must be members of the Wisconsin Daylily Society.
- Each entrant may submit a maximum of two photos. With a family membership, each family member may submit two photos for the contest.
- If an entrant submits two photos, only one photo may win regardless of the total number of votes each photo receives.
- The entrant submitting the photo must have taken the picture.
 - Photos need not be taken in the member's garden.
- Photos may be an individual bloom, cultivar clump, daylilies with companion plants, or daylilies in a landscape (garden) setting.
- Photos must be submitted in digital form. (Higher resolution preferred.)
- Winning photos will be selected by vote of the WDS membership. Each member may vote for a maximum of three photos.
- Contest winners will receive an enlarged photo of their winning entry. The size of the photo enlargement may vary depending upon the resolution of the original image.
- The Wisconsin Daylily Society reserves the right to display winning photos at WDS functions, including but not limited to the WDS web site, Garden Expo booth, WDS scrap book, and other visual presentations.

A JOINT AFFAIR

In March, we will be hosting a joint meeting at Olbrich Gardens with the Wisconsin Hardy Plant Society with Dr. Darrel Apps as our speaker. Stephanie O'Neal from WHPS has written such a great introduction to Dr. Apps that, with her permission, I am quoting here.

On Wednesday, March 18, 2009, our speaker will be Dr. Darrel Apps, one of the most highly recognized daylily breeders. Called "Dr. Daylily" by The New York Times, App's love affair with daylilies began 57 years ago, growing them under the eaves of the one-room school house he attended. His Woodside Nursery was one of the largest on the East coast (sold to new owners in 2007), with 14 acres in South Jersey producing more than 400,000 plants annually, including 300 hybrids that he produced from two distinct varieties. Ten of his hybrids have been patented, and he produced a line of everblooming daylilies marketed under the Happy Ever Appster® brand. These plants all descended from his famous 'Happy Returns', and extended the color range of rebloomers beyond 'Stella de Oro'. It is likely that many appear in local gardens, including 'Apricot Sparkles', 'Big Time Happy', 'Just Plum Happy', 'Red Hot Returns' and 'Sunset Returns', just to name a few. A graduate of UW-Madison, he also taught ornamental horticulture and did research at the University of Kentucky before developing the renowned Woodside Nursery.

When Dr. Apps retired in 2007 he moved back to his native Wisconsin, so now we can call him one of our own. Yes, even with it's snow and cold, Wisconsin is a nice place to live! Come help us welcome him back on **March 18th at Olbrich Gardens.**

A GOOD YEAR FOR GIVING

Yes, it was a very good year. WDS made charitable donations totaling over \$10,000 in 2008, an all-time high. Although we aren't yet rivaling the Gates Foundation, we have much to be proud of. The list of recipients included:

Madison Area Master Gardeners was voted to receive the 5% charitable donation from our 2008 daylily sale. Because of a tie in voting at this October's annual meeting, two organizations will share the donation gift in 2009 – Allen Centennial Gardens and Sauk County Master Gardeners Association to replace plantings lost in this year's flooding. Thanks to everyone for their many efforts over the past year which kept our coffers healthy and our generous gift giving possible.

A MESSAGE FROM YOUR PRESIDENT

Traditionally, as a year draws to a close it is a time reflect. Many notable events marked 2008 for the Wisconsin Daylily Society. WDS TOP TEN POLL RESULTS

In the latest Wisconsin Daylily Society Top Ten Favorites Poll conducted at the fall 2008 Annual Meeting, Curt Hanson's 'Bela Lugosi' was the clear winner with 41 votes. Forty-six percent of the WDS members voting selected 'Bela Lugosi' as one of their favorites. 'Bela Lugosi' has been a continuing favorite of WDS members. In the 2007 Top Ten Poll 'Bela Lugosi' came in second with 'Primal Scream' placing first. In the first Poll taken in 2004, 'Bela Lugosi' placed fourth.

In second place was Salter's introduction, 'Moonlit Masquerade', which received 36 votes. 'Ruby Spider', which placed 7th in our Poll, was the top pick in the 2008 Region 2 Popularity Poll.

Van Sellers' 2008 Stout Silver Medal winner, 'All American Chief' placed 3rd in the 2008 Region 2 Popularity Poll and made its first appearance in the WDS Top Ten Poll in 8th place. Below is a complete list of the 2008 WDS Top Ten.

A total of 89 ballots were cast with 188 different daylilies receiving at least one vote. Newer cultivars are becoming popular among WDS members. Karol Emmerich's 'Woman at the Well' (2005) received 15 votes and Jamie Gossard's 'Heavenly Angel Ice' (2004) received 17 votes. 'Heavenly Angel Ice' placed 5th in the 2008 Region 2 Popularity Poll. Favorites among the write in votes were 'Dragon King' (Kirchhoff – 1992), 'Jerry Hyatt' (Curt Hanson – 2004) and 'Michael Bennett' (Gerda Brooker – 2005).

2008's Annual Dinner and Business Meeting was another record breaker! The room at the Fitchburg Community Center held the biggest crowd yet, the food from caterer Ron Ben-Ami was mouth-wateringly delicious, speaker Ludlow Lambertson wowed us with his creations, and potted daylilies went home with lucky raffle winners. How special is that?

President Conrad Wrzesinski warmly welcomed old hands and at least nine newbees alike. He then richly thanked a whole passel of people who made 2008 a memorable year...from the Board members to the Committee Chairs to the Summer Meeting helpers to the Sale volunteers to the Expo workers to the newsletter editor and contributing writers to the composer of the WDS Summer Meeting invitation song to the WDS Chorus and kazoo accompanist to the daylily donors to the people who help with set-up and clean-up at our events to the garden tour hosts, and to the wonderful WDS membership itself. He summed it up by encouraging us to give ourselves a big round of applause and declared that "We did good".

Treasurer Kathi Dwelle reported that the WDS was still solvent to the tune of over \$46,000 (wow – that is amazing considering we just hosted the AHS Region 2 Summer Meeting)!! She then called attention to those people who had a green dot on their name badge. We were prepared to have them declared winners of some fabulous daylily or such but instead she just chuckled and said that their dues were due and would they kindly see her after the meeting. It was a dirty trick but we laughed right along with her! The Secretary's Report prepared by yours truly was approved. Incumbents Pat Sturdevant, Frances Kleckner, and Conrad Wrzesinski were re-elected and Barry Rowe won the seat vacated by Kathi Dwelle who declined to run for a second term. After tallying the votes for the 2009 recipient of the 5% donation from our sale, it was neck and neck for Allen Centennial Garden and the Sauk County Master Gardeners. By voice vote it was decided to split the donation between these two worthy groups. Lastly, Popularity Poll ballots were cast and the results will be published in this newsletter and on our website.

Having concluded the business part of the day, Conrad introduced us to Luddy (Ludlow) Lambertson from Art Gallery Gardens way down in Lake Helen, Florida. Luddy is an artist who works in several different mediums and uses color theory in developing his small but very concentrated and focused hemerocallis programs. They include out-of-the-mainstream shapes and forms, teeth and tentacles, unusual forms (UF's only, not floppy spiders), blue eyes, and patterns. He is inspired by spires, shrines, and towers plus he is an avid bird watcher; both his artwork and his daylily creations (including their names) reflect these interests. He readily admits that he likes his daylilies as ornate and weird and crazy as he can get them but he is not fond of big goopy edges and is therefore sticking to the toothy look. Prime examples are his H. 'Bed Of Nails', 'Jurassic Jaws', and 'Liege and Lief'. Luddy does not have anything against round ruffled things but because of his proclivity for architecture he prefers to perfect other shapes. Wide petals that raise up and forward with thinner sepals that fall back produce a very sculptural look that is one of his signatures. Good examples of this are his H. 'Magnificent Hummingbird', 'Rachel Lambertson', and the great 'Bird Talk'. Cool purples, lavenders, and bluish tones along with grays and silvers are what predominate in his lines although he has recently begun dabbling in other colors and is working on "Luddy-izing" them. The most difficult program he works on is the patterns. They can appear strong in the first part of the season only to fade away for the remainder of the year. Green is "up and coming" in his eyes and edges and this he feels could take patterns in a new direction. When asked if his beauties were hardy in our area, he said that he sends them regularly to the Upper Midwest and on into Canada and that many are to repeat customers. Conrad confirmed that H. 'Blue-eyed Butterfly' and 'Blue-eyed Curls' can be found in this part of the world and that he had recently added 'Bird Talk' to his own collection.

All in all, the day was fine and fun and Ludlow's talk was fascinating. WDS business was handled, good food was partaken of, an unusual hybridizing program was shown to us, some daylilies were taken home. It's hard to improve on that. Thanks to those who made the event a success.
