The WDS Plant Sale At Olbrich Gardens Sat. & Sun., August 15th & 16th



Oh my goodness! That day will be here before we know it. And we have another huge challenge ahead of us again this year! In order to break our sales record from last year, we will have to bring in more than \$37,900! Are we up to the challenge? I'm sure of it. With your help, we can do anything.

Now let's see; where to begin? Oh yes, we must get the word out, far and wide. June Johnson has been working on that since early last winter, sending notices out to Master Gardener groups and garden clubs in southern Wisconsin and northern Illinois for their 2015 online calendars. At Garden Expo she ran into the account executive of the state-by-state gardening magazines and now this year our sale will be promoted - with pictures - in the Wisconsin Gardeners Magazine! The beautiful sale flyer that June has designed will be given to the attendees at the State Master Gardener Conference in July. She will have several ads running on WPR and Larry Meiller' Garden Talk. Gardeners from all over Wisconsin will know about our sale! That's certainly a good beginning.

If you haven't done so already, be sure to check out the Daylily Sale page Vaughn & June have posted on our website. You might even find a picture of yourself on there!

The next order of business is to recruit lots of volunteers, and that's where we need YOU! Diane Goodman will once again be coordinating volunteers, and she asks that you call her at 608-643-8021 or email her at jrgoodman@charter.net.

A special note to our new members: working at the sale is a great way to get to know your fellow members better and have a very enjoyable time. Why else would more than 100 members volunteer more than 4,000 hours last year?? Maybe to earn WDS\$\$ - more than 4,500 were redeemed for plants at the sale! As a little thank you, you will earn one WDS\$ for each hour worked during the four days. Or maybe it's because working on Thursday or Friday gives volunteers the opportunity to purchase cultivars they want prior to the sale opening. Sometimes the most sought-after ones never make it to the tent.

And, of course, a successful plant sale must have plants to sell. We will be digging plants this year from the display bed at Allen Centennial Garden. Do you need to divide some of the huge clumps in your garden or perhaps get rid of some to make room for new ones? Remember that all donations are tax-deductible.

Would you like help digging your plants? If the job seems overwhelming to you, we have members willing to help. Mike Alvin and Diane Goodman are scheduling the digging events. They ask that, if you do want help, **YOU LET THEM KNOW SOON.** Call Diane at 608-643-8021 to schedule a time.

As soon as you determine which ones you will be bringing to the sale, please forward the list to Tom & me by snail mail or e-mail *trkleinheinz@att.net* so we can enter them in the database and be sure we have pictures. We again ask to have your list of donations <u>at least one week before the sale</u>. This has made our lives so much less hectic that last week before the sale.

During the week of August 9th we will be digging plants, starting with the display bed at Allen Centennial Garden. A crew will be needed in Muscoda at the Kleckners. We also expect to dig some more at Bob Keitzman's and Rotary Gardens in Janesville. There will be lots of digging to do. We really could use your help. To thank you for this extra help, you will be given 5 WDS\$\$ for each hour spent digging, in your own garden and with our crews, plus travel time.

A preliminary list of plants for sale will be posted to our website two weeks before the sale.

We will again be preparing the plants for sale in the "Prep Tent" on Thursday and Friday until all the plants are in the big white sale tent. For two years now the plants have been coming in clean which has meant that we have been able to clean up the area and leave by 5:00 on Friday.

At last year's Annual Meeting the membership voted to donate 5% of this year's sale proceeds to the Rotary Gardens in Janesville. Lisa Imhoff nominated those gardens where, thanks to Lisa, they are building up a wonderful collection of daylilies from our Sale. To capitalize on this opportunity June will issue a press release to all the papers distributed in the Janesville area entitled "Rotary Gardens Daylily Collection Will Get 'Facelift' From Donation'. In addition, she is planning to put up a poster (and a supply of bookmarks) telling guests of the gardens that proceeds from our sale will benefit their gardens.

During the summer please be thinking of a worthy horticultural project you can nominate this fall for next year's donation.

It appears that credit cards will now be a regular part of our sale. How much of our success can be attributed to them? Who knows! But it sure seems that customers are buying more when they can use their credit cards. All we know for sure is that almost \$19,000 was put on credit cards last year.

At the end of the sale last year Gene Dewey expressed a wish to step down from his softwear and hardware activities. Vaughn James stepped forward right away and will be working with Gene to learn the ropes. Thanks so much Vaughn.

At the same time, I asked for volunteers to consider taking over as chair of the Plant Sale, with the idea that they could shadow us this year. Monique Warnke sent me a message that she would help out. However, when she read the final sale report, she said it would probably take 2-3 years of shadowing!! It will be so much easier for her to do this job if she has a co-chair. Thanks Monique for stepping up to the plate. Who's going to co-chair with her??

MICHAEL BOUMAN CREATES INTEREST

"I'm bored – let's buy a home in the country with lots of problems." This cartoon caption introduced us to Michael Bouman's personal blend of daylilies and music on April 18. He named his gardens "Daylily Lay," a sly reference to Bob Dylan's "Lay Lady Lay." He is President of AHS Region 11 and sings for the St. Louis Symphony Choir. The list goes on...

Before launching into his main presentation, he recognized our Tim Fehr. He is responsible for the creation of the AHS Email Robin, now numbering over 1000 members. The Robin is open to any AHS member, and is a forum for topics and questions posed by novices and experts alike. Tim also dragged the AHS into the 21st century with a Web page presence on the Internet.

Michael was educated at Pennsylvania State University, majoring in singing and choral conducting. He taught at the college level for eight years, and then moved into state humanities councils. He was most recently Executive Director of the Missouri Humanities Council, but is now retired.

Michael began his presentation by explaining the values of gardening: people, plants, landscapes and the home. A gardener's purpose is to help all these thrive. In particular, the daylily is a symbol of health, life and vitality.

"If you want love in your life, you have to face death." In his 70 years, Michael has lost two wives and found a fiancé. His first wife, San, was a master teacher of singing. He named San Picked Me after her, a red extended bloomer. His second wife, Kathy ("Keb"), was also a daylily hybridizer. After her passing, Curt Hanson named Kathy Bouman for her in 2015. Michael is currently engaged to Karen Berry.

Michael's first daylily was H. fulva (ditch lily), which he used for landscaping. Hyperion soon followed. Then he attended an AHS Convention and discovered mail-order catalogs. When he first started hybridizing twenty years ago, he lived on a shady lot, but was able to grow daylilies at a nearby display garden. When the garden owners wanted to take over his seedlings, he and his daylilies moved to a place near St. Peters, Missouri, with an acre and a half of land.

"The curse of the right angle." Daylily Lay came with many challenges from the house, landscape and adjoining lake. Today the house is accessible, the water flows away from the beds, weed trees are gone, and ducks and geese are visible on the lake. Michael's museum work has led him to avoid sharp corners, so the landscape was designed with a "bent geometry" concept. Beds in front of the house bend around the bay window, and beds in back curve around the lakeshore.

"Don't buy a six-pack, buy a tray." Daylily Lay is now home to over 1000 daylily cultivars and 1800 seedlings. There are also many vegetable beds, annuals, perennials, bushes and trees. Included among the daylilies are his twelve new cultivars for 2015.

Michael's main hybridizing goal is "championship performance." He especially likes what he calls "citrus colors" – a lime throat surrounded by a ring of lemon, and then a burnt orange ring (see Heart Appear above). Many Region 2 hybridizers show up in his program. In particular, Oscie Whatley's pretty faces have been crossed with cultivars bearing better scapes. He occasionally tries a "Hail Mary" cross – something new and promising crossed with a solid old performer. Michael also purchases and sells seeds on the Lily Exchange. The Lily Exchange is an Internet auction site open to members of the AHS Email Robin.

Michael was awarded the 2012 AHS National Service Award for Region 11. This award also recognizes his work as an AHS Garden Judge since 2000, and a Garden Judge instructor since 2005. As mentioned, he is currently the President of Region 11.

"Create interest - this should be the motto for all museums and daylilies."

The presentation was followed by a daylily auction. Many club members acquired beautiful 2015 Bouman introductions at bargain-basement prices.

DAZZLING DAYLILIES SHOW NEEDS YOUR HELP!

To make the show really dazzle, we need your daylily blossoms. Please bring your best and fanciest into the West Ag Station between 8:30 – 10:15 on Saturday, July 18. There will be a limit of 20 per member, 40 per couple. The winner in each of the categories below receives WDS \$25:

-SELF (SOLID COLOR)

-DOUBLE

-EDGE, EYE AND PATTERN

-SMALL AND MINIATURE

-SPIDER AND UNUSUAL FORM

-BEST OF SHOW

Here are some hints as you bring blooms to the show:

BE GENTLE.

HARVESTING: Most blossoms will simply snap off and easily separate from the scape. If not, use a pair of scissors or nippers. Do not stack flowers on top of each other.

LABELING: Use a sticky tape, such as masking tape, for labeling. Leave some space on the tape, then write the name of the daylily with a good pen or magic marker. Wrap the blank part of the tape around the blossom stem.

TRANSPORTING: Place flowers in a flat container, such as a flower basket or a box lid. Again, do not stack daylilies on top of one another. If you buy trays of annuals, you can save the plastic. Then place daylilies face up in individual cells. Don't worry about water – it will be a quick trip to the Ag Station.

SCAPES: If you are willing to display entire scapes, please cut them close to the ground. Write the daylily name right on the scape, or use a plastic wrap-around label. Lay the scapes out flat – no stacking. We would like to display an example of a proliferation, if any will be available.

Once you have delivered your dazzlers, why not stay and help awhile? We need volunteers to guide visitors around, run the raffle, and tally votes. If the spirit moves you, bring treats to the break room (across from the restrooms). Stick around for the awards ceremony at the end (3:00), and exchange your pollen with others.

FIRST BLOOM OF 2015

In the midst of all the rain during the end of May a bright golden yellow flower appeared in our front garden. The flower was like a beacon of light in the cloudy grayness. The first daylily bloom of 2015 had appeared on Willy Muller's cultivar, 'Dr. Regel' (1904). Unlike more modern daylilies, the flower buds on 'Dr. Regel' are held in sheath like enclosure, which rests on the top of the scape, as shown in the picture. The flowers are also delightfully fragrant.

The date of this first flower was May 25th. This is six days earlier than the first flower of 2014, which was also on 'Dr. Regel'. Perhaps this may be an indication the daylily season will be a little earlier this year.

In pursuing the other daylilies in our garden, I sense there will be a wait before a second daylily begins to flower. Last year the second daylily to flower was 'Penney's Worth' on June 20th. While preparing this article, I checked 'Penney's Worth', and noticed scapes are forming, which may again be the second daylily to flower. The daylily bloom season has begun!
